30 Years Anniversary

30 years have passed since the day of January in 1992, Connie Meyer went to Moscow to help the then young priest, Father Pavel Vishnevsky, with social and humanitarian aid in the Russian Orthodox Church. Connie Meyer had been invited by the Moscow Patriarchate. The picture below shows the church Feodor Studit, which was almost in ruins. Connie Meyer set about helping the needy in the congregation, and through home visits and practical sense through extensive experience in both nursing and practical congregation tasks, she solved many problems. She also applied for funds and helped families with children and the sick. She became a beloved "angel" in the church - until her tragic death. An extraordinary general meeting resolved to honor Connie's memory by continuing her work. We want to maintain contact with the congregation with support, visits and information about "HumanCare Russia". Luckily, we knew many from the congregation from visits while Connie was alive.

This year we will celebrate the anniversary partly at a couple of events in the East and West of Denmark. We will offer lectures, exhibitions and maybe more bazaars with collection, so we can continue to help.
